### **Summer 2018 Newsletter**

This month we re-convened a meeting of community stakeholders to discuss a comprehensive response to the problem of addiction in Warren County using a Blueprint prepared by the Addiction Policy Forum (APF). Thank you to the nearly 200 leaders from local government, schools, law enforcement, EMS, criminal justice, faith community, mental health, children services and treatment providers who came together to learn about the Blueprint. APF is a diverse partnership of organizations, policymakers and stakeholders whose mission is to work together to elevate awareness around addiction and improve national policy. The Blueprint contains 21 recommendations, 3 of which were identified as being essential pieces of the larger framework. During the forum, attendees were asked to identify which of the 3 priority areas they would like to work on first. Overwhelmingly the group said protecting children impacted by parental substance use disorder is the number one priority. To read Warren County's Blueprint click here

Multiple agencies and workgroups are working to develop and implement evidence based practices that are appropriate for our county, and we've seen some success. It's our hope that the Blueprint will spur the sharing of time, talent and resources for a greater impact. By working together, focusing on the recommendations and priorities identified by APF, we can achieve even greater success in reducing the impact of addiction in our community.

Protecting children impacted by parental substance use disorder

Increasing capacity for medicationassisted treatment utilizing all three FDA-approved medications

Implementing criminal justice diversion programs

Delegation and high-level decision makers from various governmental agencies to discuss specific challenges impacting our county.

We heard from Senator Portman and Congressman Chabot about their policy initiatives, and we had candid conversations with them about issues we're

facing in Warren County.

Our group also heard from members of the President's policy team on some of their key initiatives. Some common threads were the recognition of the devastating impact the opioid crisis is having throughout our country and the need for skilled workforce to fill open jobs.



As we tackle these same challenges here at home, we appreciate the work our national leaders are doing to help bring about solutions and look forward to partnering with them.



# Warren County Water & Sewer



The County provides water service to 10 political jurisdictions within the county and sewer to various areas throughout the county.

## **Water Softening Project**

A 2015 survey of customers indicated they want soft water and are willing to pay for it. Earlier this year the BOCC selected the engineering firm AECOM to design the water treatment plant upgrades and softening facilities. The BOCC signed the contract to kick off the project in June. Construction is anticipated to begin in 2020.
