On the evening on May 19th, Dispatcher Brittany Creager received a 911 call from a hysterical caller reporting her husband was not breathing. Brittany quickly confirmed the caller's location and shipped the call to both the Police and Fire dispatchers to be dispatched. Brittany immediately launched EMD (Emergency Medical Dispatch) and provided CPR instructions to the caller until Carlisle PD arrived on scene. Officers Little and Krebs from Carlisle PD took over CPR until JEMS and Carlisle Fire Dept. arrived on scene and took over patient care and began ACLS (Advanced Cardiac Life Support). This gentleman fully recovered and walked out of the hospital. He and his family requested to speak at the City of Carlisle Council Meeting showing their gratitude and requesting to meet those that had a part in saving his life.

# **Exceptional Calls**

A percentage of the Communications Center's calls are reviewed by an outside service called Quality Performance Review (QPR). This includes quality assurance and accreditation services allowing us to have unbiased reviews of random pulled calls. We receive weekly and monthly reports from them. Below are the recent exceptional reviews. Great job!

Cassady Gatio 1503447 The caller said that her mother had fallen and she did not have the strength to get her up. This caller quickly became irritated with the questions and started to yell at you. You did an outstanding job remaining calm, professional, and explaining what was happening. She did hang up on you in DLS, but you handled this call like a pro! Keep taking calls this way!

Kelly Fiebig 1507981 - The caller said that her elderly mother had back pain and then fell. Excellent call flow while giving the DLS instructions. You read them at a pace that allowed the caller time to acknowledge each one. Great catch when you started to say that help would be there soon. You quickly corrected yourself and said help would be there as soon as possible.

Stephanie Abbot 1522174 - The caller said that her son has liver cirrhosis and couldn't breathe. The caller said that her son has too much fluid on him and that is the problem. Excellent customer service with this elderly mom by having a very kind and caring demeanor. You told her that you could get someone out there to help when she said her son just couldn't make it to the car

#### Brian Holtel 1535889

This caller needed help for an outside fire. You did a great job with this case Brian! You were able to correctly select and use the 67-Outside fire protocol to process this case. Also, by making correct answer selections we can be assured the final coding is correct. Well done!

Jennifer Gabbard 1500896 This caller needed help for a gas leak
in his home. You did a great job with
this case Jennifer! You were able to
gather all needed information from
this caller with no deviations. I also
really liked how you made sure to relay to the caller to get out of the
home, he did previously state he was
disabled and not able to get out. You
made sure he knew to get out so he
could remain safe. Great work!

Lyndsey Stump 1487585 - This caller needed help for a possible gas leak in a home. You did a great job with this case Lyndsey! You Were able to correctly select and use the 'Gas leak/odor inside a building' Sub-Chief Complaint to process this case. You also made sure to relay all appropriate PDIs and Case Exit instructions to this caller ensuring she would remain safe while waiting for responders. Great work!

Sophia Abrams 1517818 - This caller needed help for downed trees and power lines. You did a great job with this case Sophia! You were able to gather the needed information from this caller in Key Questions with no deviations. You were also very helpful with this caller while trying to get the correct location of this scene. Great work!

# **Exceptional Calls (Cont.)**

**Emmaline Ritchie** 1478808 - The caller said that he was having chest pain and recently had a surgical procedure completed. Great job having the caller take 4 more baby aspirin even though he told you that he already took one earlier. Having the caller have his wife complete the tasks on X-2 was also insightful. This kept the caller from getting up and exerting himself. Keep taking calls like this!

Paige Barton 1535978 - This caller is reporting that she felt like she was going to pass out. Paige did a very good job selecting Protocol 31 for a Priority Symptom over a report of fibroids that are bleeding that could be a priority symptom but not verified yet. Paige made sure to ask the caller all of the Key Questions and also determined that she was not alone. This provided someone to be able to open the door for the responders which prevented the patient being in danger of falling and injuring herself.

Seth Whitlock 1479434 - Great active listening during this case making sure to change the answer to the question, "Are there any electrical hazards?" when the originally input answer was not reflective of the final answer that was provided. Seth was also able to answer the question, "Tell me exactly what is burning." without having to ask the question due to this active listening. Seth was able to correctly relay the closing instructions to the caller effectively.



Having these partnerships and continuing to build upon them is critical for successful response operations when a disaster does occur. The worst time to meet someone is during response after disaster has struck!



# **Local Support Agencies Annual Meeting**

Director Melissa Bour, EMA Operations Manager Sydney Renner, and LEPC / Grants Coordinator Frances Ficke attended the Local Support Agencies (LSA) annual meeting which was hosted at Lebanon Correctional Institute (LeCI) this year. This meeting gathers individuals from the prisons (Lebanon Correctional , Warren Correctional and Dayton Correctional ), EMA, local fire and police departments, Ohio Highway Patrol and other key partners. LeCI hosted a tabletop exercise to discuss response operations and how partners may aid response if incarcerated individuals escape or another type of emergency occurs. The meeting ended with a demonstration of how the prison's response teams handle different situations that arise within the prison. These partnerships are important to help strengthen the resiliency of our community.

# Safety Tips for the 4th of July

- 1. Always use fireworks outside and have a bucket of water/hose nearby in case of accidents.
- 2. **Designate a safety perimeter.** If you have ground-based fireworks like a fountain, spectating from at least 35 feet away is best. For aerial fireworks, you'll want everyone to move back to a distance of around 150 feet.
- 3. **Ditch faulty fireworks.** Sometimes fireworks don't go off, but duds always pose a risk. The important thing to know is that you should never try to relight or approach a failed firework. Let duds sit for 5 -10 minutes before you put them in a bucket of water. This can prevent injury from a delayed explosion and disarm the firework permanently so you can safely dispose of it.
- 4. **Supervise children when they are handling sparklers.** Sparklers burn at about 2,000 degrees Fahrenheit—hot enough to melt some metals. Sparklers can quickly ignite clothing, and children have received severe burns from dropping sparklers on their feet or touching body parts.
- 5. Soak both spent and unused fireworks in water for a few hours before discarding.
- 6. Never place a part of your body directly over a firework or hold a firework in your hand when lighting. To safely light fireworks, make sure they are secured on the ground away from people and animals and use a stem lighter such as a grill lighter.
- 7. **Only light one firework at a time.** Lighting multiple fireworks at the same time increases the risk of accidents occurring from the fuse burning faster than designed.
- 8. **Avoid alcohol consumption when handling or using fireworks.** This should be pretty self-explanatory.
- 9. Consider safe alternatives to fireworks such as party poppers, bubbles, silly string, or glow sticks.

Did you know that more pets go missing on the Fourth of July than any other day of the year? The American Humane Association reports that July 5th is the busiest day of the year at many animal shelters, as companion animals that fled in fright the night before are found miles from their homes, disoriented and exhausted.



#### 🖟 Bring Your Pets Inside

The loud noises and flash of the fireworks can cause your pets to get scared and run away. Don't bring your pet along to a firework display, they will feel more safe and secure at home.


#### Microchip & ID Your Pets

Make sure your pet has visible ID tags and a microchip with updated information. If your pet is lost during the festivities, someone will be able to contact you if they find your missing pet.



## ☀ Provide a Safe & Secure Space

Have a space designated for your pet such as a quiet room or crate. Provide them with treat toys such as a Kong to help keep them busy and distracted. Playing calming music or keeping the T.V. on can also help cancel out the loud noises.



Walk and play with your pet to tire them out before the fireworks begin to help alleviate stress and avoid accidents. While walking before and after festivites, watch out for leftover firework debris.






