

LEADS Testing Update

LEADS has made some changes to their LEADS test. Your LEADS test will still need to be completed every 2 years; however, the security awareness training will now need to be taken on an annual basis in accordance with the latest CJIS Security Policy revision (12/7/22). All users that complete Awareness Training will be issued an annual certificate.

How do you know when you expire?

Your agencies LEADS TAC has access to run expiration reports to see when you expire. If your agency does not have a LEADS terminal (Waynesville, Morrow, Carlisle & Harveysburg (Non-terminal agency) you can call into the Communications Center, and we can run the report for you.

Non-terminal agencies will also get a yearly roster update form which will include the expiration dates of their users. If you need help with these reports or have questions, please don't hesitate to call LEADS or the Communications Center Supervisor at 513-695-1574.






HI, I AM MAX!

This course focused on planning before and operations during a mass fatalities incident, as well as establishing and operating family assistance centers. This course not only provides valuable information and insight for planning purposes but also helps Frances and Alyssa work towards their Advanced Professional Series certificate.

Frances also wrapped up the HAZWOPER 40 course. HAZWOPER stands for Hazardous Waste Operations and Emergency Response. This forty hour training, was spread out over multiple weeks and blended traditional classroom lectures with hands-on experience, including a full-scale exercise.

Through the course, Frances was able to further her knowledge of hazardous chemicals and corresponding emergency response operations. She also brought many great ideas back to Warren County EMA and LEPC to further efforts around preparedness and mitigation.

Did you know that there are a couple different types of Rescue trucks in Warren County's fire departments?

Some departments have a rescue truck that also acts as their first out engine, because the truck also has engine (pumper) capabilities. Clearcreek Fire District utilizes R21 (#1) as their first-out engine from ST21. This truck was just put in service in September of 2022. Franklin Twp. (#2) and Carlisle (#3) have engines and rescues that run out of the same station, but the rescue trucks can respond as either an engine or rescue. Some departments have rescue trucks that are not pumpers and focus on having a full complement of rescue tools. These are sometimes called "heavy rescues". Examples of these are Wayne Twp's R91 (#4) and Deerfield Twp's R57 (#5) Loveland Symmes R61 (#6) even has a trunk-mounted crane rated at 32,000 lb!


