School Emergency Radio Testing

Didn't school just end for summer break? It's that time of the year again where our Warren County schools (excluding Lebanon) will test their MARCS in School Emergency Radio. This test is performed twice a year to make sure the radios are working as designed AND so that school personnel are familiar with the procedure in the event of a true emergency. These radios are tested August 1-September 7 & March 1-31 every year. These radios provide quick and direct contact to the Communications Center during a violent, life-threatening situation, for example an active assailant. There are 61 school buildings that have these radios, 52 public schools and 9 private schools.

When school is back in session, make sure to account for school buses and the stops you may get behind.



Trying to keep units organized while making sure we had help responding to the officer shot was stressful, but it was also the day I was cleared on police radio!

Since being here I have learned that even though I thought had seen and heard it all after 25 years in fire and EMS and working in the emergency room, 911 takes it to a whole new level. There isn't a shift that goes by that something doesn't leave me shaking my head.

My biggest challenge so far is learning the geography in the county that I am not familiar with. Many callers use nicknames or old names of locations while many others just don't know where they are. Being able to pinpoint where they are located can be difficult at times, but it seems to get easier as time goes on.



NEW: 8 YEAR VALIDITY NOW AVAILABLE FOR OHIO DL/IDs



Effective July 1, 2021 Ohio Driver License and Identification Cards (DL/IDs) may be issued for a period of either four or eight years at the request of the customer for the issuance either a compliant or standard DL/ID. This extended period is available to persons 21-65 years of age with correct U.S. legal presence and the fee table for the eight year credentials can be found online at bmv.ohio.gov.

There are no differences in the design and security features of the eight year credential compared to the four year credential.




Hazard Mitigation: Flooding

DEFINITION:

Floods occur when water is delivered to a water body (i.e. stream, river, lake) at a rate and in an amount that is greater than normal. Flooding can occur from excess rainwater not draining properly, river water overtopping its banks, or melting snow.

Flash Flooding	Areal Flooding	River Flooding
<p>Generally develop within 6 hours of immediate cause such as heavy rains, slow-moving storms, dam failures, etc. These floods cause a rapid rise of water over low-lying areas or a large amount of water that cannot be absorbed in urban areas.</p> <p><i>*Example: On September 3, 2018, a 100-year rain event occurred that caused flooding in Lebanon and Clearcreek Twp.</i></p>	<p>Flooding that develops more gradually, usually from prolonged and persistent moderate-to-heavy rainfall. This results in gradual ponding or buildup of water in low-lying, flood-prone areas as well as small creeks and streams.</p> <p><i>*An example of this is flooding that occurs on golf courses and farm fields</i></p>	<p>Occurs when river levels rise and overflow their banks or edges of their main channel and inundate areas that are normally dry. Usually occurs from heavy rains, dam failures, rapid snowmelt, or ice jams.</p> <p><i>*An example of this is the flooding that occurs in Morrow and South Lebanon along the Little Miami River and on Dayton-Oxford Rd. in Franklin along the Great Miami River</i></p>
		

Urban Flooding	Ice/Debris Jams
<p>The result of development and the ground's decreased ability to absorb excess water without adequate drainage systems in place. This typically occurs when farm fields or woodlands turn into roads and parking lots. Flooding can occur when the amount of water generated from rainfall runoff exceeds a storm water system's capability to remove it.</p> <p><i>*This may occur in areas near new construction</i></p>	<p>Stationary accumulations of ice or debris that restrict water flow. As ice or debris moves downstream it may get caught on obstructions to water flow such as bridge pylons, river bends, etc. When this occurs, water can be held back, causing upstream flooding. When the jam finally breaks, flash flooding can occur downstream.</p>



Did You Know?



12 inches of fast-moving water can carry away a small car.

6 inches of fast-moving water can knock over and carry away an adult.

WHEN FLOODED TURN AROUND DON'T DROWN



18-24 inches of fast-moving water can carry away most large SUVs, vans and trucks.



DAMAGES AND IMPACTS FROM FLOODS:

Floods can damage roadways, structures, and infrastructure. Flash Flooding can lead to injury and loss of lives. It can take days or sometimes weeks for floodwaters to recede enough to start recovery operations. Floodwaters can include chemicals, debris and other hidden hazards that can affect public health and safety. Excess moisture can also increase insect activity and breed mold.
