Susan Spencer, Personnel Officer, was present to introduce newly hired employees within various departments.

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Susan Walther, Children Services Director, was present along with Lisa Cayard, Warren County Head Start Director, and Amy Ledyard, Solutions, to discuss the need for the Therapeutic Interagency Program (TIP).

Ms. Cayard explained that the TIP program is a pre-school program for children with at-risk factors that include drug use within the family environment, neglect, sexual, physical and/or emotional abuse and domestic violence. She presented the attached statistics relative to success of the program in other counties and the cost associated with implementing this program in Warren County within the Head Start Pre-School.

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Commissioner Young discussed his budget concerns relative to the introduction of a new program that would be funded through grant and county funds, should grant funds become unavailable and the county is requested to keep the program at general fund expense.

Commissioner Jones stated that this is an evidence based program that has been proven to help children overcome issues and allows them to develop the skills necessary to succeed and get out of the "system".

The Board stated their agreement to fund the program at approximately \$50,000 per year with the condition that the outcomes be tracked in order to prove the outcomes are worth the investment.

Chris Brausch, Sanitary Engineer, was present along with Chris Wojnicz, Assistant Engineer, to discuss the request for qualification submittals relative to the Water Softening Project.

Mr. Brausch reviewed the submittals and discussed the staff review.

Mr. Wojnicz stated that the goal of today's work session is to identify the three firms that the Board desires to interview relative to the next step in the process.

There was discussion relative to the large gap in the staff reviews between the second and third submittals.

Mr. Brausch stated that the reason for the gap is not that the other firms are not qualified but they are not up to speed as much as the other two. He questioned the possibility of amending the language in the process to allow for the interviewing of two firms rather than three in the event the Board elects to do so.

There was discussion relative to the investment of time that goes into preparing for presentations before the Board given the gap between the second and third firms.

The Board discussed the history of choosing other firms based upon their review of qualifications that differ from staff review.

Upon further discussion, the Board determined to proceed with interviews from the following three firms:

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Chris Brausch, Sanitary Engineer, informed the Board of a request from McGill Smith Punshon for availability of sanitary sewer to the recently annexed Irwin Farm on Grandin Road and also a separate request from a property owner along Turtlecreek Road within the Village of South Lebanon.

The Board, along with Bruce McGary, Assistant Prosecutor, discussed that upon annexation, the Village of South Lebanon became the service provider for the properties.

There was discussion relative to the Urban Service Area of Hamilton Township, along with the history relative to the establishment of the current sewer improvement area.

There was discussion relative to balanced, planned growth versus property owner rights.

Upon discussion, the Board stated their desire for a discussion with the newly elected South Lebanon Village Council members once they are in office.

Upon motion the meeting was adjourned.

#### Importance of TIP

- TIP = Therapeutic Interagency Preschool
- The TIP program is a seamless integration of child protection, mental health, and Head Start preschool resources.
- Mental health treatment program that specifically targets pre-school children who have experienced severe trauma, including multiple forms of sexual abuse, physical abuse, emotional abuse, neglect, and domestic violence.
- Goals of the TIP Program are to ensure and monitor ongoing safety, provide intensive home intervention, pre-school learning, mental health services, and enhance developmental/cognitive development.
- Abused children, as a group, manifest significantly higher levels of behavioral and emotional problems and academic failure than non-abused children. These deficits predispose children

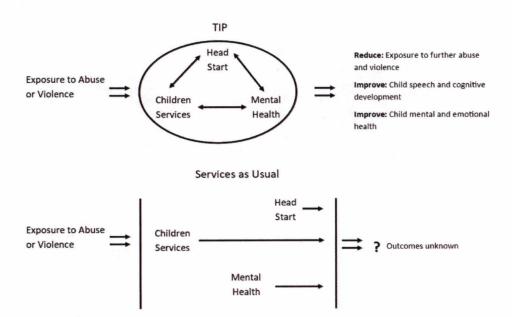
- toward negative trajectories including early school drop-out, substance abuse, promiscuity, depression, poor medical health, and low occupational attainment.
- The social and emotional competence of young children is a stronger predictor of early academic performance and success than either cognitive abilities or family background.
   Maltreated children are at greatest risk for serious social and emotional problems

#### **TIP Serves:**

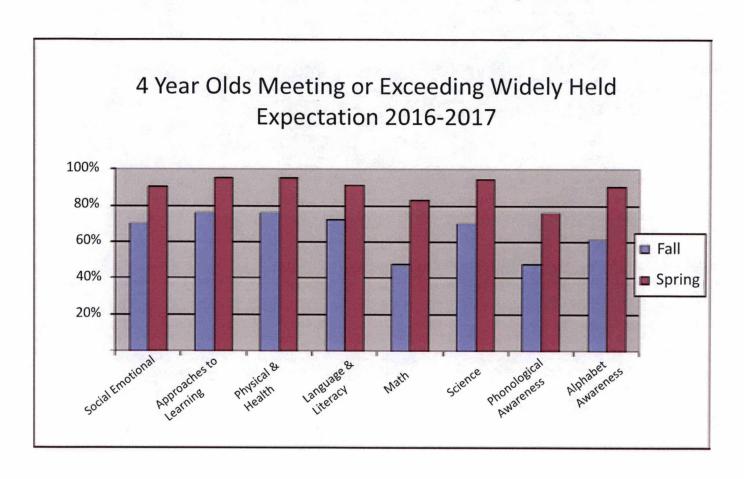
- Open Cases and/or with Children Services (Priority for placement)
- · Children from families with many complex challenges
- · Children with maltreatment and severe trauma histories:
  - o Opioid/other drug use in family/home environment
  - Neglect
  - Multiple forms of Sexual Abuse
  - Physical Abuse
  - Emotional Abuse
  - o Domestic Violence
  - Other significant trauma history

#### By serving the children, we are also able to reach and support:

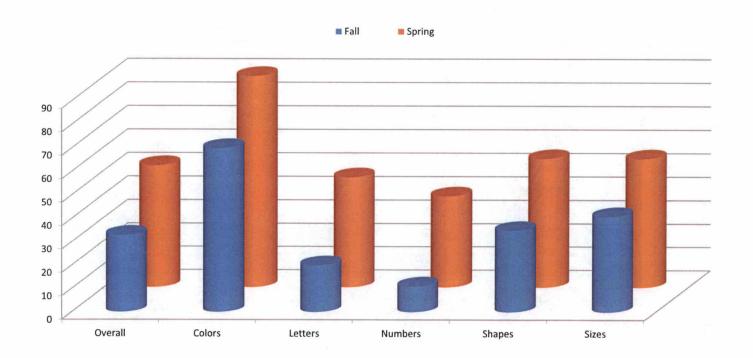
- · Parents engaged in drug and alcohol abuse and addiction

### **Head Start Works – Warren County Children**

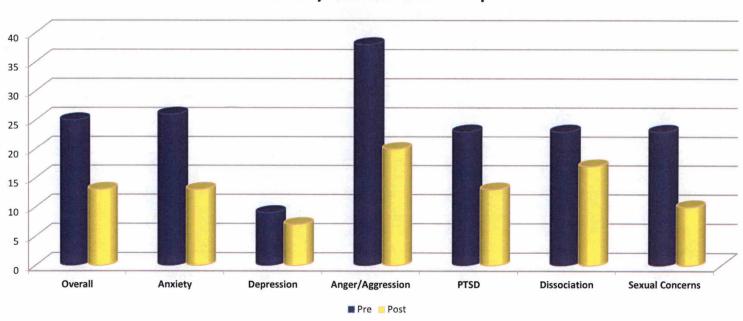


## **Head Start Works – TIP Children (Butler Co. 2012)**



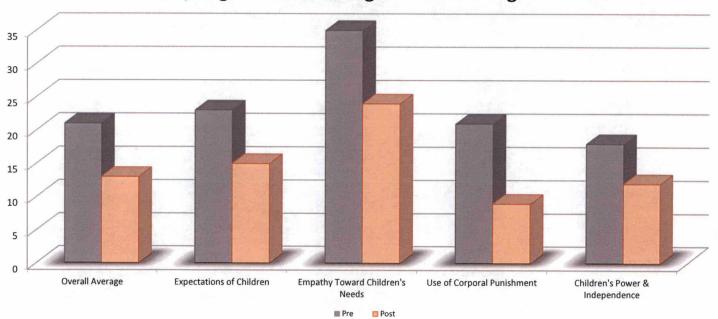
