DISCUSSIONS

On motion, upon unanimous call of the roll, the Board accepted and approved the consent agenda.

Susanne Mason, Warren County Grants Administration Program Manager, was present along with TJ Butler, Eco Development Production and Commodities Manager, to request the Board consider an Ohio EPA Market Development Grant relative to their Styrofoam recycling business.

Mr. Butler presented the attached PowerPoint presentation providing background information on Eco Development and their desire to expand their recycling program through a market development grant which provides a 100% matching fund grant for the purchase of 2 semitrailers and 1 semi-cab. He stated that they plan to employ two drivers and offer free logistics for the first month to provide the \$100,000 match for the \$100,000 grant.

There was discussion relative to what the government purpose of the truck and trailer would be as well as if they will be dedicated to the recycling collection only.

Mr. Butler stated the goal is to reduce the amount of goods that reach the landfill. He then discussed the benefits to businesses of utilizing their Styrofoam recycling program by using less dumpster space, therefore, reducing costs.

Upon further discussion, the Board resolved (Resolution #23-1260) to approve and authorize the Warren County Solid Waste District to submit a 2024 Market Development Grant to the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency on behalf of Eco Development, LLC.

Chris Brausch, Sanitary Engineer, was present along with Chris Wojnicz, Assistant Sanitary Engineer and Michael Zeiher, Business Manager, for a review of the 2023 – 2025 Capital Improvement Projects.

Mr. Brausch then reviewed the proposed capital expense for each year as well as the various proposed funding sources. He then stated they will continue to look for ways to fund the projects which will include potential tap fee increases and rate increases which are scheduled for a septate work session in October.

ADMINISTRATIVE HEARING

SITE PLAN REVIEW APPLICATION OF SHAKER WOODS IN TURTLECREEK TOWNSHIP

The Board met this 26th day of September 2023, for the continuation of the administrative hearing to consider the site plan review application of Shaker Woods in Turtlecreek Township.

Michelle Tegtmeier, Building and Zoning Director, reviewed the project through the attached PowerPoint, stating that the applicant is requesting a variance for the side yard setback to 5' versus the required 15' and also approval of their site plan.

Bruce McGary, Assistant Prosecutor, clarified what the Board is being requested to decide.

Richard Paolo, attorney for the applicant, stated that in rebuttal to the testimony provided by the Turtlecreek Township Trustees, the Board of County Commissioners determine the access to the proposed subdivision, not the Trustees.

There was discussion relative to the requested side yard setback variance of 5'. Mr. Paolo amended the requested variance request from 5' to 12' which is the same for the adjacent Shaker Run PUD.

There was discussion relative to the site plan review criteria.

Mr. Paolo stated that the proposed density within Shaker Woods development is half the density permitted in the Mixed Use Center.

Commissioner Young stated he doesn't encourage higher density development when the Township provided testimony relative to their concern with Fire and EMS access into the subdivision.

The Zoning Department PowerPoint presentation was admitted into evidence as Exh. PP.

Mark Linger, Drees Land Acquisition, presented into evidence Exh. A - a map measuring the distance from the new Turtlecreek Township Fire Station.

Commissioner Grossmann discussed the division of land and the fact that the land has not been subdivided.

Mr. McGary provided clarification relative to there being no development standards that require two access points in the review standards. He stated the only review standards are listed in Slide #18 of the Zoning Department PowerPoint presentation.

Mr. Paolo stated that the Board approved Greentree Meadows Subdivision which is located along Greentree Road and presented Exh. B, the resolution approving the rezoning application, allowing only one access into the subdivision.

Jonathan Sams, Turtlecreek Township Trustee, testified to his concern with the site plan as his conversation with the Turtlecreek Township Fire Chief is what sparked the objection. He stated that the subdivision has one access point. He then stated that a fire truck turning into the 73-lot subdivision at the same time residents are trying to get out because the homes are so close together is cause for concern.

Mr. Sams then presented testimony stating the difference between this proposed subdivision and Greentree Meadows including the wider entrance as turnarounds which can accommodate fire apparatus vs. the proposed Shaker Woods single access.

Mr. Sams then testified that the proximity of houses causes safety issues because fire can jump from house to house. He stated the preference to maintain the required 15' side yard setback as required and not approve a planned unit development.

Mr. Linger provided testimony that the width of access on Greentree Meadows will be the same as Shaker Woods. He then stated that the buildout will not be complete before 2025 when additional access onto SR 63 is opened to the public.

Stan Williams and Ryan Cook, Regional Planning Commission, were administered the oath and testified that there is no Thoroughfare Plan designation for this area.

Mr. Cook testified that in response to Exh. B – Greentree Meadows, the condition of approval was done with input from the County Engineer as this is designed as a boulevard style and acts as two entrances.

There was discussion relative to the street section for Shaker Woods Vs. Greentree Meadows as well as the number of lots permitted if no waiver was approved.

Commissioner Young stated safety concerns when houses are permitted to be constructed "on top of each other".

Commissioner Jones stated that standards are put in place for a reason and that the applicant is comparing the standards that were put in place in Shaker Run in 2001 when the current Township Trustees had no input.

There was discussion relative to the inability to review the overall parcel vs. only a portion of it being very challenging.

The Board stated the concern of not knowing how the remainder of the parcel will be developed.

Upon further discussion, the Board unanimously voted to close the administrative hearing and resolved (Resolution #23-1261) to deliberate in private and announce a decision at a later date.

On motion, upon unanimous call of the roll, the Board entered executive session at 11:50 a.m. Pursuant to ORC 121.22(G)(8) to discuss the possible investment or expenditure of public funds to be made in connection with a request for assistance in an economic development project and exited at 12:25 p.m.

Upon motion the meeting was adjourned.
