Functional Needs Registry

The Access and Functional Needs Registry helps state and local government identify and assist individuals with Access and Functional needs during an evacuation. It is an efficient way to catalog individuals and their needs, map the evacuation area, and deploy the essential resources to where they are needed most. You can register yourself, a loved one or a facility. There is no cost to Warren County residents to register.

Warren County Emergency Management developed this registry to allow citizens with special needs and their associates an opportunity to provide information to emergency response agencies, so emergency responders can better plan to serve them in a disaster or other emergencies.

For the purpose of this project, a special needs individual is someone who cannot receive, understand or act upon emergency protective orders. For example, if a fuel tanker overturned in your area and there was an evacuation order, this program would help make sure that you have the information and recourses needed to evacuate. Examples of those who should register are individuals who are physically and/or mentally disabled, those with mobility limitations, deaf and hard of hearing, frail elderly, children or anyone else who may need assistance during a disaster.

The information collected here will not be available to the general public and all information will be held securely and only accessed for the purpose of emergency response and planning.

Did You Know?

Just a Few Reminders – By Samantha Hall

Reminder #1 - Regarding WCDES procedure for crashes on county/twp roadways in WCSO jurisdictions, as of 02-26-2013 we were instructed to no longer call OSP83 to handle crashes unless requested to do so by WCSO.

Reminder #2 - Whenever making a CFS for a public service, every effort should be made to get the address to where the incident took place. Once this address is obtained from the caller, it should be placed in the address field. If you are unable to obtain said address you should then use the generic 19-<police agency> in the address field. All public services for all law enforcement agencies go to the district car, unless it is for a specific unit or an OIC request. This is also true if the address is 19-<police agency>.

Use of Technology to Locate Emergency Victims – By: Brian Hotel

We have done training and spent time focusing on Wireless Phase II technology and rebidding to find a caller's updated information. Other developing technologies that help locate emergencies include vehicle telematics and mobile medical alarms.

Vehicle telematics is the use of wireless and satellite technology to detect, collect and transmit vehicle data, especially for crashes and other emergencies. Companies can now reliably locate a vehicle and relay its location and condition to emergency responders. These systems include:

- Onstar, a subsidiary of General Motors, is a subscription based service that includes access to
 emergency operators at the touch of a button or initiated automatically by the vehicle upon
 detection of a crash. Other features include directions, stolen vehicle tracking, remote unlock,
 diagnostics and a mobile app.
- Ford 911 Assist is part of the SYNC system on Ford vehicles that uses a Bluetooth-paired and
 connected phone to initiate a 9-1-1 call directly to local responders, even if the occupant is
 unable to reach the necessary controls. Before initiating the emergency 911 call, SYNC will
 provide a 10-second window to allow the driver or passenger to decide whether to cancel the
 call.
- Chrysler has also recently introduced Uconnect Access, which is activated by pressing the "911" or non-emergency "Assist" buttons. It does not have an automatic accident notification system. Hyundai has a similar system known as "Blue Link". Toyota has "Safety Connect", which includes help buttons and automatic crash notification. Honda has "HondaLink", which gives maintenance updates and roadside assistance. This is not a comprehensive list, but covers the most popular auto brands.

Advances in medical alarms include MobileHelp, which is the first company to offer coverage outside the subscriber's home. The system's mobile device uses the AT&T wireless network, which allows the alarm company to obtain GPS coordinates of the emergency victim to relay to emergency services. It also has an attached online tool that allows a caregiver to locate the user. I know of at least one instance a couple weeks ago in which Warren County Communications received an alarm activation from this company and Clearcreek Fire District responded. It turns out that the user was in the home, but she could have been anywhere and we need to be prepared to handle these calls. Keep your eye on these and other new tools that will aid both dispatchers and responders.

Call of the Month

Structure Fire at 3095 Lytle Rd, Wayne Twp.

On Sunday September 14th Cassidy Gatio took a 911 call from a resident reporting a loud explosion coming from her neighbor's house. She advised that there was white smoke coming from 3095 Lytle Rd in Wayne Township. The caller also reported that two elderly males with burns to their face, neck arms and hands exited the residence. Initial reports were that no one was in the residence. Command quickly requested Careflight be put on standby. Fire crews on the scene quickly went to work and had the fire under control. Careflight was then called and requested to the scene to transport both males. The on call fire investigator was also called to the scene. The two males were transported to Miami Valley Hospital with reported 3rd degree burns. DP&L was also called to the scene. Fire is still under investigation but believed to be caused by the furnace. Fire dispatcher was Bob Anson.


