In the early morning hours around 3:30 a.m. on June 3rd, Lebanon Communications received a call reference a suspicious person/theft from a vehicle in the area of Deerfield Rd. & East Orchard Ave. Great job to those that were working; Ron Kronenberger, Amber Applegate, Tescia Davis, Kelly Fiebig, Hannah Obyran and Shelby Davis.

I wanted to pass along a HUGE thank you and compliment to Warren County's dispatch for their assistance the other night. In CFS19010288 we had a significant mutual aid response from WCSO and Mason (K9) reference two juveniles fleeing from 114 after being caught breaking into vehicles. Initially WCCC was monitoring our traffic and echoing everything to their units that picked up the call, to the point I never had to call over and give them updates or correct anything they transmitted. When the call heated up and we were playing cat and mouse with some of the juveniles, they were instrumental in starting additional backup and getting us a K9. Again, I didn't have to make phone calls or ask for anything, they read my mind and had information immediately available over PSAP. The original CFS lasted several hours and spilled over into additional calls, and the WCCC dispatchers were instrumental in the outcome of the original offense.

I can't say enough how grateful I am for how pleasant everyone was to work with on top of how well they teamed up with me and Maggie. It was truly a blessing to have such a wonderful working relationship with everyone that night, and I want to make sure that doesn't go unrecognized by us and their superiors. I hope we can all continue working together and helping in such a positive manner; it makes everyone's shift a little bit easier.

Out of State SSN & Driver History Queries

When asked to run an out of state SSN, the only state, besides Ohio that you can do this for is Kentucky and even then, you have to run it as an OLN.

Out of state drivers license queries can be run by using either the; OLN (best) or name, date of birth & sex. Once the out of state query has returned, the Communications Center will also run the information through Ohio. This is to check the Ohio database for hot hits since out of state drivers license queries only query the state specified.

When running out of state queries, you will not get the drivers history. If a driver's history is needed, the Communications Center can run a separate "KQ" query. In order to run a KQ query, the Communications Center will need the OLN or name, date of birth & sex.

States that require a purpose code (C=Criminal Justice) and Attention (who is requesting the information) fields to be completed in order to get the information to return are; AK, AL, CO, CT, GA, HI, MD, MS, MT, NC, ND, NM, PA, VA, WA, and WY.

** It should be noted that some states do not provide or enter driver's history**


Warren County LEPC Functional EOC Exercise

On May 8th 2019, the Warren County LEPC held a functional Emergency Operation Center (EOC) exercise

to test InterPsap communication and the functionality of Warren County EOC in response to a chemical incident occurring in the City of Franklin. The exercise tested seven objectives:

- Notification of Response and Support Agencies
- Emergency Operation Center
- Resource Management
- Communication
- Population Protective Actions
- Emergency Public Information
- Traffic and Access Control





Franklin Twp. F.D., WC Dept. of Emergency Services, WC Sheriff's Office, WC Health District, WC Telecom, American Red Cross, Greater Cincinnati HazMat Unit and WC CERT. Additional individuals in attendance were from Cincinnati Fire Dept., Butler Co. EMA, Hamilton Co. EMA, Clermont Co. EMA, Deerfield Twp. Fire Dept. Hamilton Co. Communications, and Ohio EMA.

The scenario presented was a chemical incident on the 2nd Street bridge in the city of Franklin that required the activation of the WC EOC as the result of a chemical plume. Exercise play focused on communication between dispatch centers, Emergency Operation Center activation and operations and notification/warning to both responding agencies and the public.

The exercise helped to foster more effective communications between dispatch centers and enhanced the knowledge of EOC operations.

Franklin Boxboard produced recycled paperboard and paperboard products. The plant had been in operation for 100 years and is between 170,000 & 200,000 square feet. It closed due to the changing market conditions in the papermill industry August of 2011. This cost Franklin City 81 jobs.
